Purpose:

This course is designed to help students become productive and impactful research scholars. We will discuss topics related to developing publishable research and becoming your own research entrepreneur.

Readings:

All readings are either available online or will be distributed the first day of class

Class Participation

Class participation is a significant component of the overall grades. Participation will be based on your critiques of students' snapshot papers and contributions to in-class discussions, quality of questions and commentary.

Critiques of students' "snapshot" papers: "Snapshot" are incomplete works in progress, and consist of ideas that are still being thought through and tested. As a consequence, students often feel more vulnerable discussing their work during this stage of their research development. I pledge to make this class to be a safe environment for students to think through critical issues without feeling that they are being overly criticized. Your goal as a reviewer is to provide thoughtful feedback that is both supportive and developmental. Reviewers should test peers' arguments for their strength, identify problems to correct, and offer specific corrections for improvement. All comments should be supportive.

Contributions to in-class engagement: To facilitate class participation, it is imperative that all reading, video and Internet-based assignments be completed *before class*.

During all weeks (including those in which you are presenting your research), you will also be expected to comment on your colleagues' snapshot papers.

Thematic Assignments

For most sessions, you will be asked to complete a professional development assignment.
